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






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WHAT time of year do tourists visit?


Visitation by quarter - Year Ending June 2018






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WHO are our visitors travelling with?






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WHAT transport did they use to get here and around?

The domestic leisure* drive market in focus

Just under a third (28%) of all domestic visitors to the region were self-drive leisure travellers in YE June 2018, which is an estimated 202,000 visitors.


Domestic Source Markets

NT residents made up 66% of the domestic leisure drive market for Greater Darwin. This may reflect Darwin residents traveling to the 'Outer Darwin' region on short trips, e.g. an overnight trip to Litchfield. New South Wales/ ACT and Victoria/ Tasmania represented 19% of this market.


Length of Stay

Approximately 76% of domestic leisure drive visitors stayed for three nights or less. Influencing this result is the high proportion of Territorians travelling for one night.

Length of Stay - Domestic Leisure Drive Market




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HOW do internationals get here?

The majority of international visitors entered the country through capital cities on the east coast, making up over half of all visitors to the region (52%). Around one third of international travellers entered or left through Darwin directly.




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
WHERE did they stay?




Darwin welcomed approximately 50,000 passengers from 45 ships in the year ending June 2018.

National Park is popular with tourists Litchfield

Visitors to Litchfield National Park were estimated at around 319,000 in YE June 2018, down 8.7% on the YE June 2017.

Berry Springs Nature Park is also a popular swimming hole which had around 146,000 visits.

Located within Darwin, the Casuarina Coastal Reserve and the Darwin Botanical Gardens are popular spots for both locals and tourists.

More information on the surveys:

Visitor number, night and spend estimates are derived from Tourism Research Australia's (TRA) National and International Visitor Surveys (NVS and IVS). These surveys are based on sample rather than census, and as such, are subject to sampling variability. When using these estimates at the destination level, this variability increases. Confidence intervals and sample for the region are highlighted in the table below.

Where available, Tourism NT has provided information from other sources to be used in conjunction with the NVS and IVS estimates. It is recommended that other information sources are also used such as population statistics from the Australian Bureau of Statistics, feedback from local operators, information from local Visitor Centres, data from local councils, TripAdvisor etc.

PLEASE NOTE: Change in methodology for the NVS from 2014 – estimates are not directly comparable to previous years. More information on the change to the NVS methodology is available on Tourism Research Australia's website.

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
